Kumi Week #47: Gender-Based Violence

Week 47 of Kumi Now is now available [on the website](#). Worldwide, the United Nations reports that 1 in 3 women and girls experience physical or sexual violence in their lifetime and concludes that, "Violence against women is as serious a cause of death and incapacity among women of reproductive age as cancer, and a greater cause of ill health than traffic accidents and malaria combined." To be clear, gender-based violence is a serious problem facing every society and country.

Thus, it is no surprise that in the occupied Palestinian territory gender-based violence is further exacerbated by the realities of the occupation. Please read the essay on this topic along with the story of Shereen, a mother of four. And here are some facts for you:

Just the facts...

Roughly 1,360 night raids are conducted on Palestinians each year.

Nearly 40% of women in Gaza face domestic violence.

50% of Palestinian women and 63% of men agree a woman should tolerate violence to keep the family together.

Checkpoints are a common location of harassment and other gender-based violence by Israeli soldiers.

Women face escalating racial harassment, assaults, shootings and attempted kidnappings by extremist settlers.

Palestinian law provides limited gender equality. However, old local laws maintain the domination of patriarchal traditions in the society.

In Gaza, 62.1% of women and 92% of young women are unemployed.

The State of Palestine lacks a unified law to protect women against all forms of violence, including sexual abuse and harassment.

In the first half of 2020, 33% of the marriages registered in Shari'a Courts in the West Bank were for girls under 18.

Calls to a helpline in the oPt related to abuse and violence increased dramatically during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Understanding Gender-Based Violence. Just the facts...

- Roughly 1,360 night raids are conducted on Palestinians each year.
- Nearly four in ten women in the Gaza Strip face domestic violence, mostly by their partners.
- 50 per cent of Palestinian women and 63 per cent of Palestinian men agreed that a woman should tolerate violence to keep the family together.
- In Gaza, about 3,000 displaced pregnant women suffer lack of access to basic services.
- 40,000+ pregnant women in Gaza are deprived of access to basic reproductive health services.
- In Gaza, 61% of women and 86.3% of young women are unemployed. The female labor force participation rate is 16%.
- In the West Bank and Jerusalem, 26% of women and 64.7% of young women are unemployed.
- Women face escalating racial harassment, assaults, shootings and attempted kidnappings by extremist settlers.
- Calls to a helpline in the oPt related to abuse and violence increased dramatically after the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Some laws that PNA had enacted provide for limited gender equality. However, women cannot enjoy this equality because of continuing application of old local laws that maintain the domination of patriarchal traditions in the society.
- The State of Palestine lacks a unified law to protect women against all forms of violence, including sexual abuse and harassment.
- The state of Israel regularly utilizes the prevention of prisoner's visits as a punitive

measure against Palestinians.

- “Honor killings” have been more common in the last decade, becoming one of the main causes of femicide in Palestine.
- 93% of surveyed women have suffered or still suffer from verbal harassment.
- Women are legally allowed to file for divorce, but divorced women are socially blamed for their broken relationships and are considered a burden on their families.
- Married women in poor households are three times more likely to experience repeated physical violence than well-off women (29% versus 9%).

Women’s office at the following address with a note asking why the U.N. is not keeping Israel accountable to United Nations Security Council (UNSC) [Resolution 1325](#). Explain that by not holding Israel accountable to international law, the U.N. is allowing violence against Palestinian women and girls. In your note, encourage the U.N. to act by fully implementing UNSC Resolution 1325 and to hold Israel accountable for its actions.

Women’s Center for Legal Aid and Counselling

The Women’s Centre for Legal Aid and Counselling (WCLAC) is an independent Palestinian non-profit and non-governmental organization established by a small group of women in 1991. By forging a feminist vision based on the principles of gender equality and social justice, WCLAC plays a prominent role in addressing gender-based violence in Palestinian society’s public and private spheres.

The organization aims to address the causes and consequences of gender-based violence within the Palestinian community as well as gender specific effects of the prolonged military occupation. These issues are interconnected and are of equal importance. For nearly three decades, the Centre’s work has bridged the need to address discrimination and violence against women within Palestinian society, and the need to support the national struggle for freedom and independence from Israeli occupation.

As a leading defender of women’s rights in Palestine, WCLAC is proud of its uncompromising commitment to provide social and legal counselling and emergency shelter in an environment where human rights abuses are rampant and women’s issues are regularly overlooked. Furthermore, it proposes bills and law amendments, works on policy developments, and monitors and documents violations of human rights as a consequence of the conflict.


For our Kumi Action we will be reading and sharing the Kairos Palestine document.




Ghost Hunting by Raed Andoni

About the film:

"**Ghost Hunting** {1h 34min, 2017}. The figures are quite clear: since 1967, some 750,000 Palestinians have endured a stay in one of Israel's prisons or interrogation centers—places you really don't want to go, as filmmaker Raed Andoni makes abundantly clear in his hybrid documentary *Ghost Hunting*. For the film, he cast men who, like himself, have served time in the infamous Moscobiya Prison in West Jerusalem. He then gets them to reconstruct a whole complex from memory, down to the smallest details; it serves as a backdrop for bringing suppressed experiences to the surface. Grueling, humiliating interrogations and desperate days in chokingly small cells are reenacted by people who actually experienced them. While one man allows himself to get carried away in the role of ruthless interrogator, another is devastated by the exact reconstruction of a prison cell. Can this really be called a reconstruction, or has the torture of the past started all over again? The distinction between reality and dramatization becomes less and less clear."




Salata Baladi by Nadia Kamel

About the film:

"**Salata Baladi** {1h 45 min 2007}. Award-winning Egyptian filmmaker Nadia Kamel's heritage is a rich blend of cultures, languages and religions stretching across continents. Prompted by the realization that her 10-year-old Palestinian-Egyptian nephew is growing up in an era when talk of purity and civilizational clashes is all too common, Nadia urges her feminist, communist, pacifist mother, Mary, to share the treasures of their diverse family history. Mary, born in Cairo to an Egyptian Jewish father and an Italian Christian mother, became Muslim when she married Nadia's father, an Egyptian with Abkhazian origins. But as Nadia and Mary weave their way through the family's multi-ethnic fairy tales, they inevitably bump into a silence shrouding an estranged Egyptian- Jewish branch of the family that emigrated to Israel in the 1940's. Nadia and Mary embark on an unexpected and sometimes heart-wrenching journey, confronting persisting complexities along the way."

On Akka's Shore by Umama Hamido

About the film:

“On Akka's Shore {60mins- 2019} is a fictional memoir of Umama and her friend Tareq Al Jazzar based on hallucinations, dreams and out-of-body experiences, scenes slip between Akka in Palestine, a Palestinian refugee camp in Lebanon, Hamido's city of birth, Beirut and London, their current home. On Akka's Shore takes us on an exploration of the chaos of memory in relation to personal and collective history. ‘Yesterday I dreamt that I was flying over the streets of Beirut. I was my camera, my body and my eye and all of me was one with the lens. You asked me how it was. I told you, the feeling resembles everything in it. Do you think places get stuck in time when we leave them?’ (Umama Hamido). On Akka's shore was supported by Jerwood Charitable Foundation, Pacitti Company and Artsadmin.”
