
Dear Kumi Now supporter,


On the Ground for Palestine

Understanding Preserving History and Culture: Just the Facts...

- The Israel's Defense Ministry's secretive security department, Malmab, has for decades run a program to conceal the events of 1948 so as to avoid unrest among the country's Palestinian population.
- During the British mandate colonial authorities used around 3,700 Arabic names of localities, towns and villages.
- By contrast, there were just 200 Hebrew toponyms, most of them being names of Jewish settlements.
- Immediately after the creation of the state of Israel a campaign to "remap" Palestine was launched, replacing Arabic names with Hebrew names so the new state could lay its claim to towns, villages, and various other geographical features.
- A 1948 letter read: "The conventional names should be replaced by new ones ... since, in an anticipation of renewing our days as of old ... we must begin in the fundamental Hebraicization of our country's map."
- Israel has destroyed some 530 Palestinian villages.

The United Nations observes June 1 as the Global Day of Parents, acknowledging the critical role that parents have in the lives of their children. But it is common for Palestinian parents to spend time worrying about their children and the reality that, in the end, the occupation has more control over their children than they do as parents. And many Palestinian parents spend this day thinking about, or trying to visit, their children held in Israel's military court systems. Worst of all are the parents who have seen the lives of their children taken from them by the weapons of Israeli occupation forces.

For our Kumi Action we will share the stories of children whose lives have been cut short by occupation.



June 4 to 10: Week 23 - Environmental Effects of Occupation

As the United Nations celebrates June 20 as World Refugee Day,¹ we want to work to restore hope to those original Palestinian refugees and their descendants.

For our Kumi Action we will send copies of U.N. General Assembly Resolution 194 to those that really need to read it.



June 25 to July 1: Week 26 - Nuclear Israel

The Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT) was signed on July 1, 1968. According to the U.N., “More countries have ratified the NPT than any other arms limitation and disarmament agreement, a testament to the treaty’s significance.”¹ Only five countries are not party to the treaty: North Korea, South Sudan, India, Pakistan, and Israel.

For our Kumi Action we will design nuclear hazard signs and give them to Israel.
