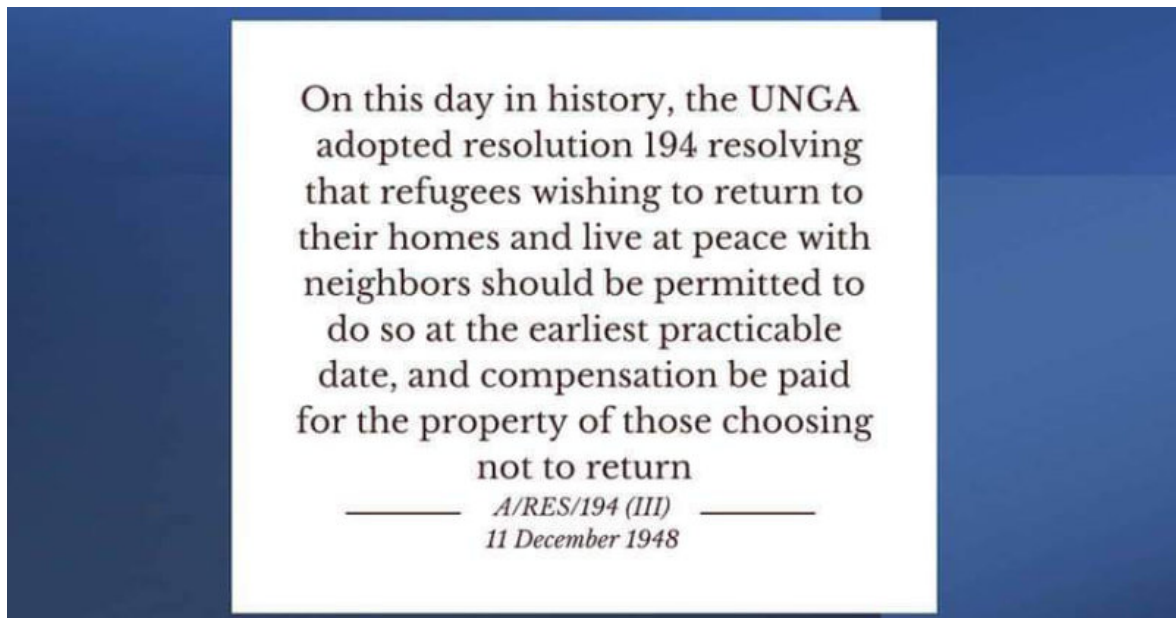

December 11 is the anniversary of the passage of U.N. Resolution 194 in 1948. It stated, "refugees wishing to return to their homes and live at peace with their neighbours should be permitted to do so at the earliest practicable date, and that compensation should be paid for the property of those choosing not to return and for loss of or damage to property which, under principles of international law or in equity, should be made good by the Governments or authorities responsible." This Week's Entry

Kumi Week #50: Right of Return

Week 50 of Kumi Now is now available [on the website](#). Over 5 million Palestinians (first-generation refugees and their descendants) are recorded as displaced persons as a result of the Nakba (the Palestinian catastrophe of 1948). During and following the 1948 war, more than 600 Palestinian localities were depopulated and destroyed and over 800,000 Palestinians were dispossessed. Furthermore, another 250,000 Palestinians were forced from their native lands and homes, becoming internally displaced persons (IDPs) within Israel. The majority of the internally displaced refugees still live within a few kilometers from their former villages, while a majority of the Palestinian refugees in the neighboring Arab countries still live within 100 kilometers of the border to Israel and are denied the right to return to their homes.

Please read the essay on the Right of Return along with the story of Lubya Village. And here are some facts for you:

Understanding the Right of Return. Just the facts...

- In 1948 over 1 million Palestinians, 73.2% of the native Palestinian Arab population, became refugees or IDPs.
- More than half were driven out under direct military assault, while others fled after hearing of massacres committed in Palestinian towns such as Deir Yassin, Ad Dawayima, Eilaboun, Saliha, and Lydda.
- More than 400 Palestinian cities and towns were systematically destroyed by Zionist and Israeli forces, while Jewish immigrants were quickly moved into Palestinian homes that remained.
- In December 1948 the UN General Assembly passed Resolution 194, which

states, "refugees wishing to return to their homes...should be permitted to do so at the earliest practicable date" and calls for compensation to those that choose not to return and for damage to property.

- The Palestinian right of return has repeatedly been confirmed by the UN General Assembly.
- There are now at least 6.6 million refugees and 427,000 internally displaced persons, 67% of the Palestinian population as a whole.
- More than 4.6 million Palestinian refugees live in camps in Jordan, Gaza, the West Bank, Syria, and Lebanon.
- An additional 60,000 Palestinians have been displaced in the West Bank due to home demolitions, revocation of residency rights, construction of illegal settlements on stolen Palestinian owned-land, the construction of Israel's Apartheid Wall.
- Palestinian refugees are the largest and longest-standing population of displaced persons in the world.
- In the over 70 years of Palestinian displacement, the UN has successfully repatriated refugees in numerous other conflicts, including Bosnia/Kosovo, Abkhazia/Georgia, Cyprus, Namibia/South Africa, and Iraq/Kuwait.

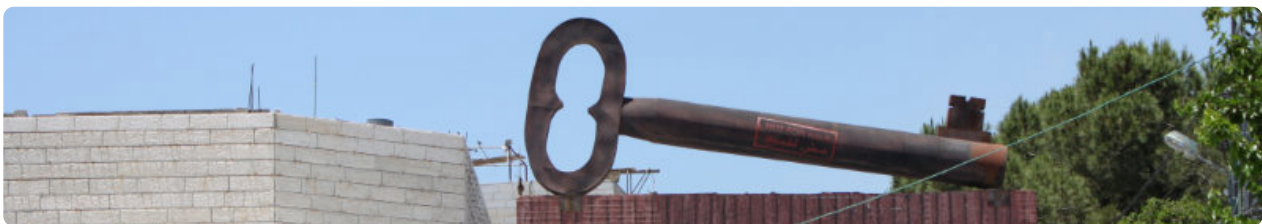

First, you can watch ***The Village Under the Forest***, a 54-minute documentary that tells the story of Lubyah, the village described above. Screen it for your class, your church group, your family, your school club, etc. You can [purchase the video online for less than US\\$8, or rent it for US\\$3](#). Watch a trailer [here](#).

But please don't stop with a film screening! Lubyah is just one of the many destroyed Palestinian villages that have been covered with the JNF forests funded by overseas donations. If you look at these forests on Google Maps you see reviews that praise

these locations for their beauty and recreational opportunities. The stories, rights, and villages of Palestinians are being buried online just as they are in real life. Alert other travelers to the true stories of the lands they are using by leaving a review on Google Maps.

We suggest you leave a 1 or 2 star review that says something like: “While this is a beautiful area, the truth is that this forest was planted over destroyed Palestinian homes and villages and is land that rightfully belongs, according to international law, to those refugees and their descendants. I encourage everyone to urge the JNF to both acknowledge and right these wrongs so that Jews and Palestinians may live in peace as neighbors.”

Lifta

Finally, Lifta is one of the few Palestinian villages to not be entirely leveled. It is now a park, popular with Israeli Jewish citizens who use its pools for pleasure and for their ritual ablutions. If you read the reviews they are overwhelmingly positive, with no mention of the injustice done to its owners. Zochrot

Zochrot (*remembering* in Hebrew) is an NGO working since 2002 to promote acknowledgment and accountability for the ongoing injustices of the Nakba, the Palestinian catastrophe of 1948, and the conceptualization of the Return as atonement for the Nakba and a chance for a better life for all the country’s inhabitants.

This week, we mark the occupation and annexation of the Syrian Golan. Israel occupied the Syrian Golan in 1967, then passed the Golan Heights Law in December of 1981, a move condemned by the United Nations at the time but backed by the United States in 2019.

For our Kumi Action we will discourage travel companies from doing business with Israeli settlements.



December 24 to 30: Week 52 - Christians in the Holy Land

Palestinians in the occupied territory face increasingly difficult circumstances due to the Israeli occupation. This has led many Palestinian Christians to emigrate, leading to a diminished Christian presence in the Holy Land. This week, as the World Council of Churches publishes the Ecumenical Prayer Cycle for Palestine and Israel, the Kumi Community is focusing on this problem.

For our Kumi Action we will be encouraging our local churches to preach on Palestine.
